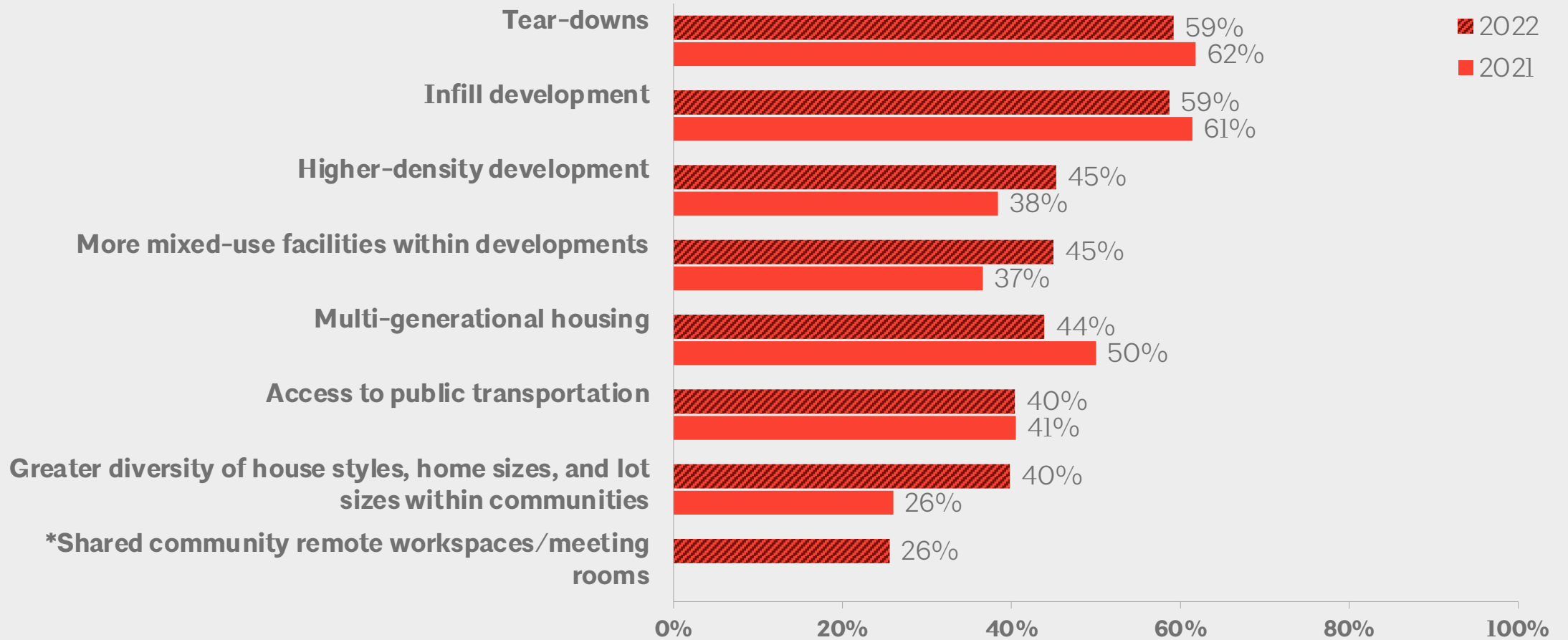

**Diversity of homes styles within communities saw a large increase in popularity while multi-generational housing declined**

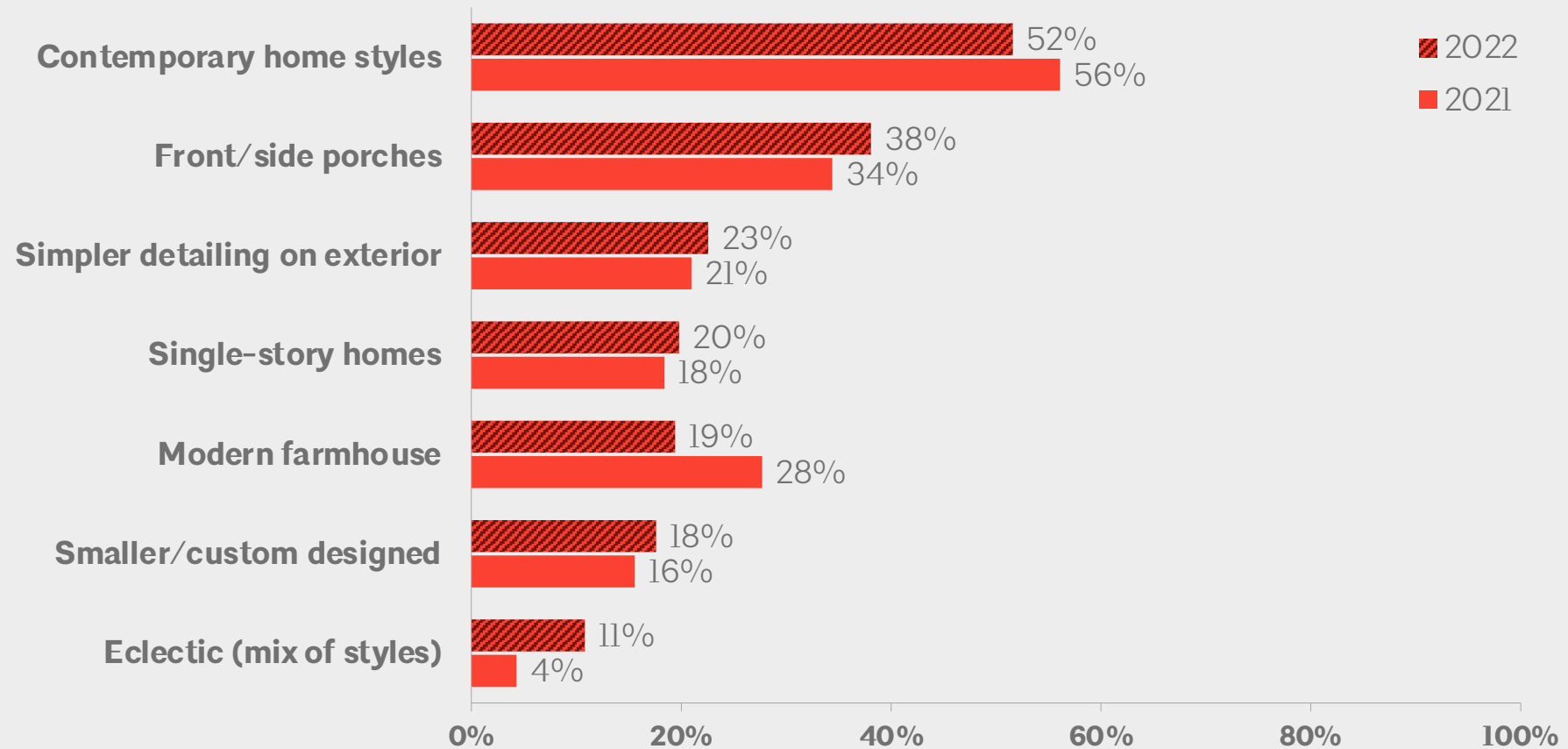

% of respondents reporting popularity of home style “increasing” minus % reporting “decreasing,” data from Q3 2022 compared to data from Q3 2021

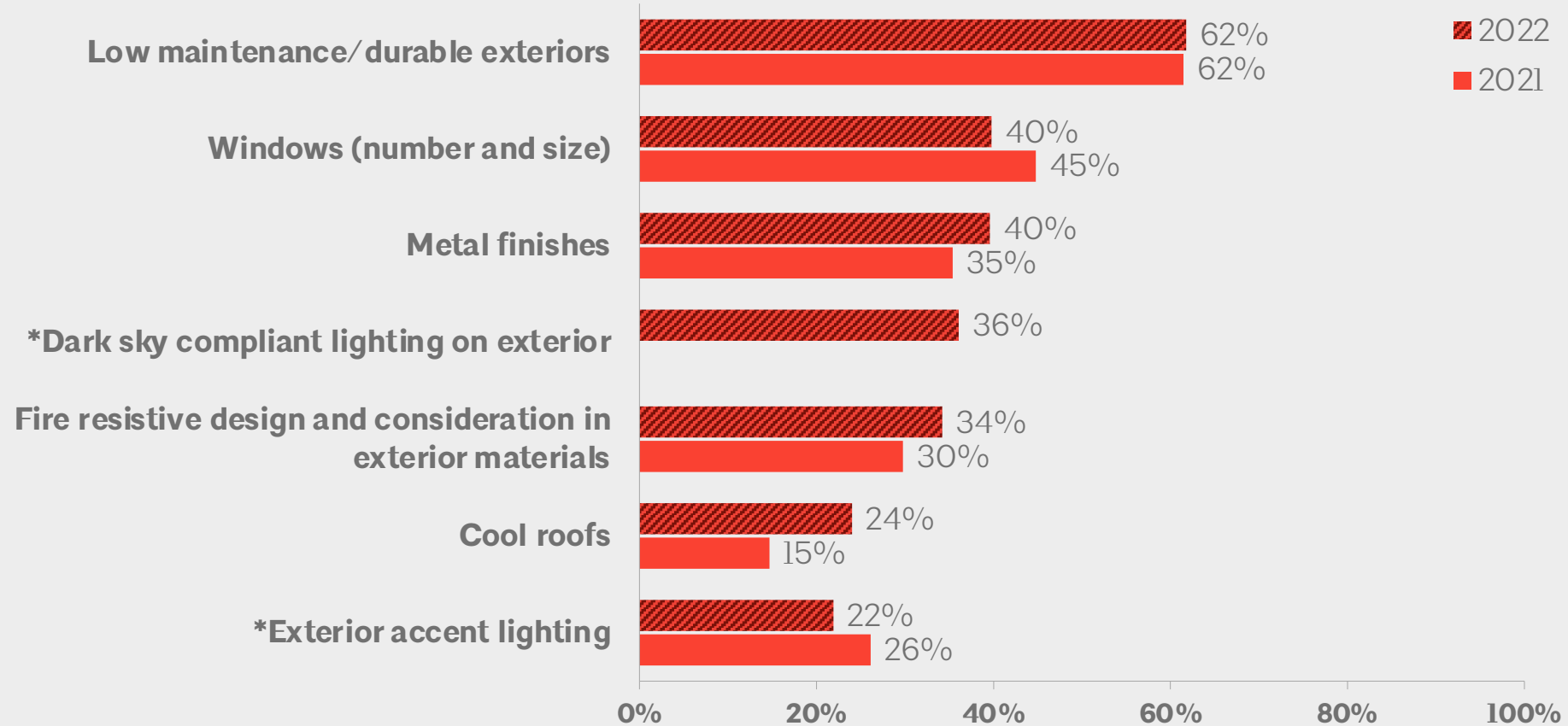

**Durability/low maintenance remains a popular choice for home exteriors along with more and larger windows**

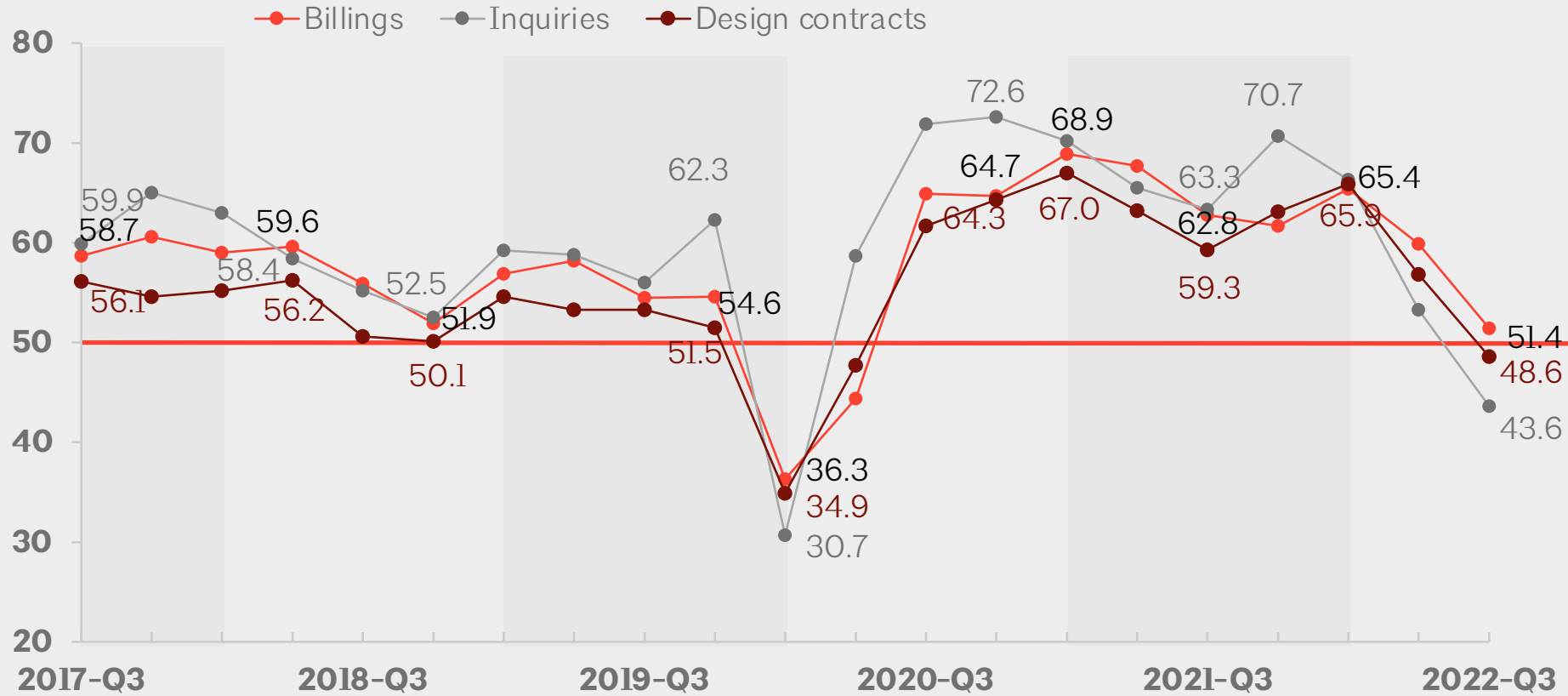
% of respondents reporting popularity of home exterior “increasing” minus % reporting “decreasing;” data from Q3 2022 compared to data from Q3 2021

**FIGURE 4** While project billings remained healthy in Q3, inquiries and design contracts showed weakness for the first time since Q1 2020

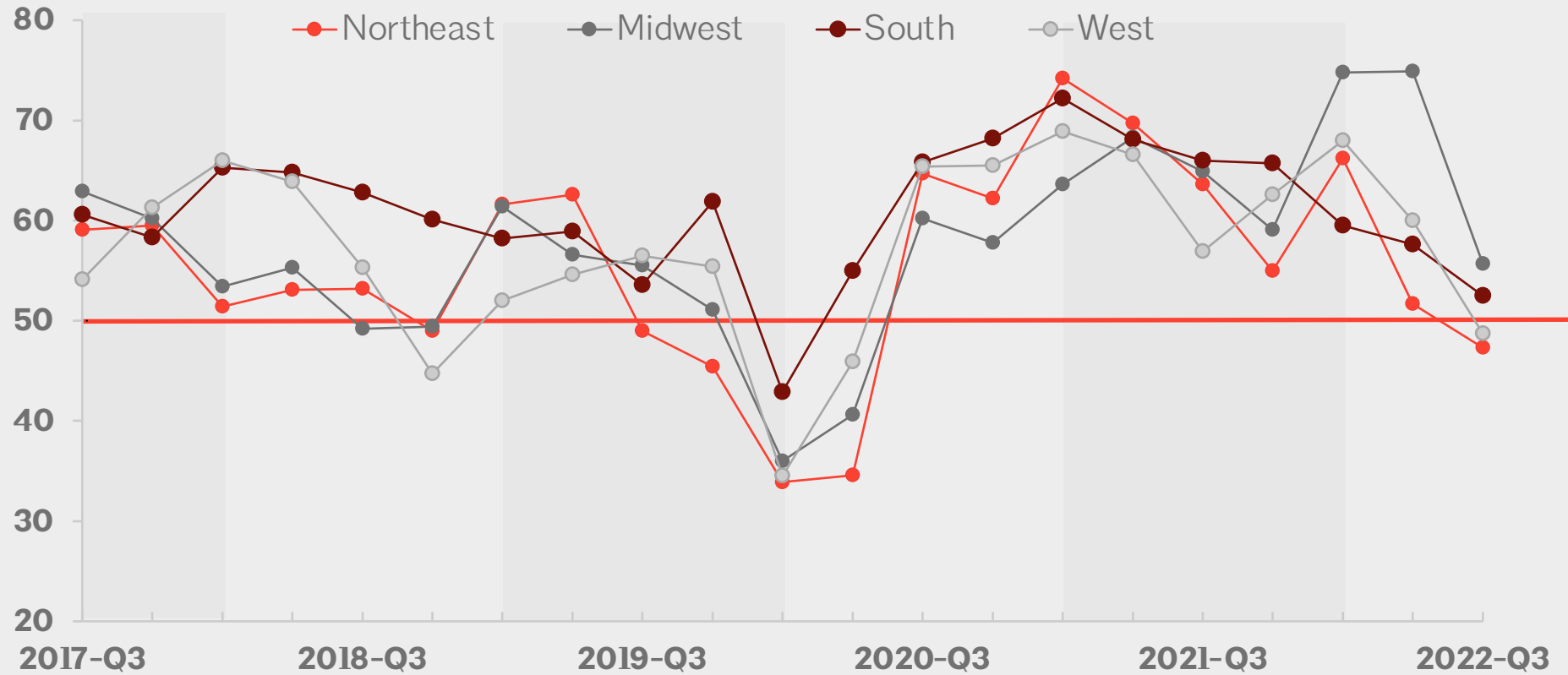

**FIGURE 5** Firms in the Northeast and West reported weakness in Q3 while firms in the Midwest and South continued to report healthy billings

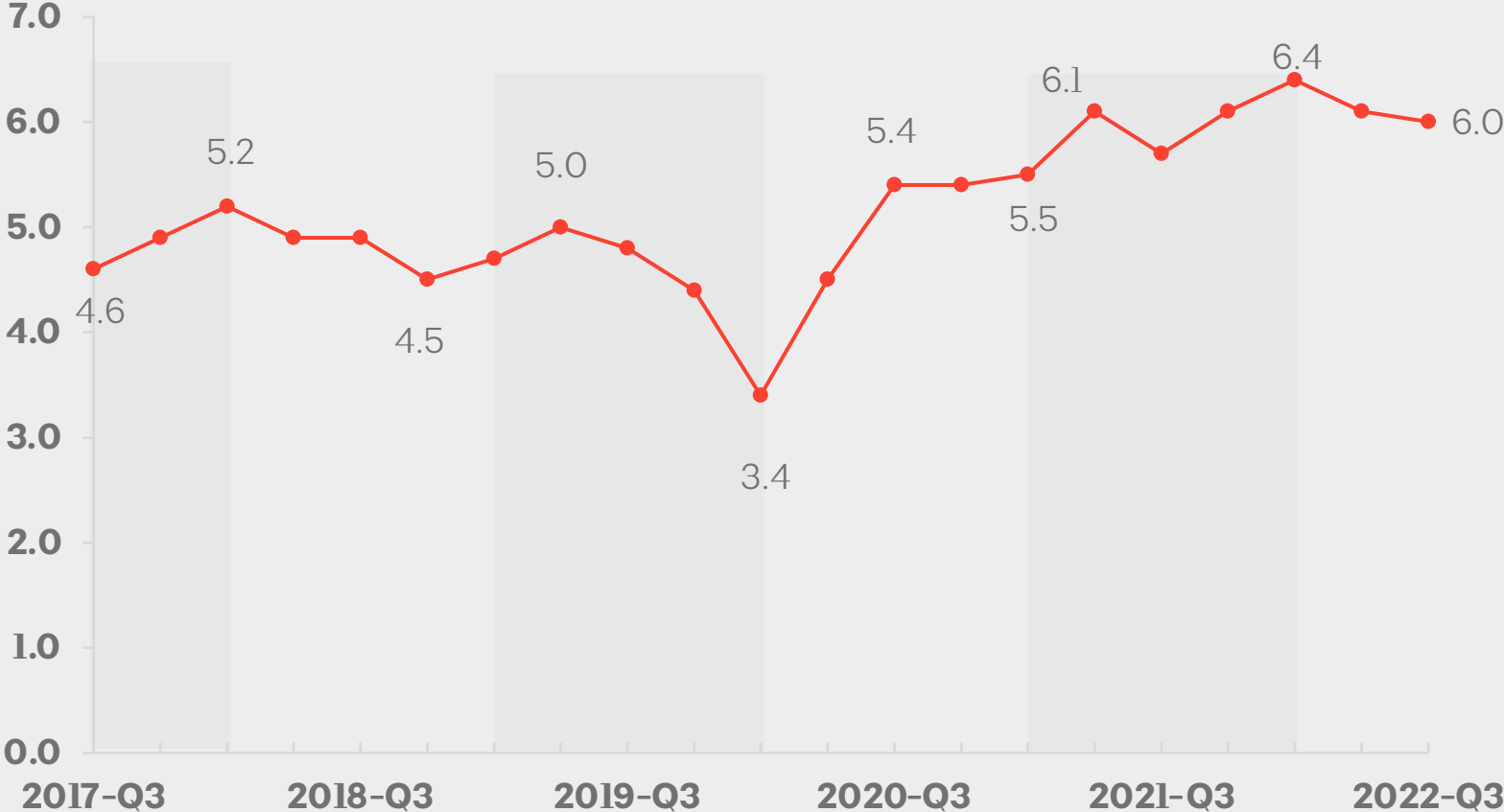
Diffusion index for billings: 50 = no change from previous quarter; data are seasonally adjusted; data from Q3 2017-Q3 2022

Number of months of project backlogs, averages across all firms; data are not seasonally adjusted; data from Q3 2017-Q3 2022

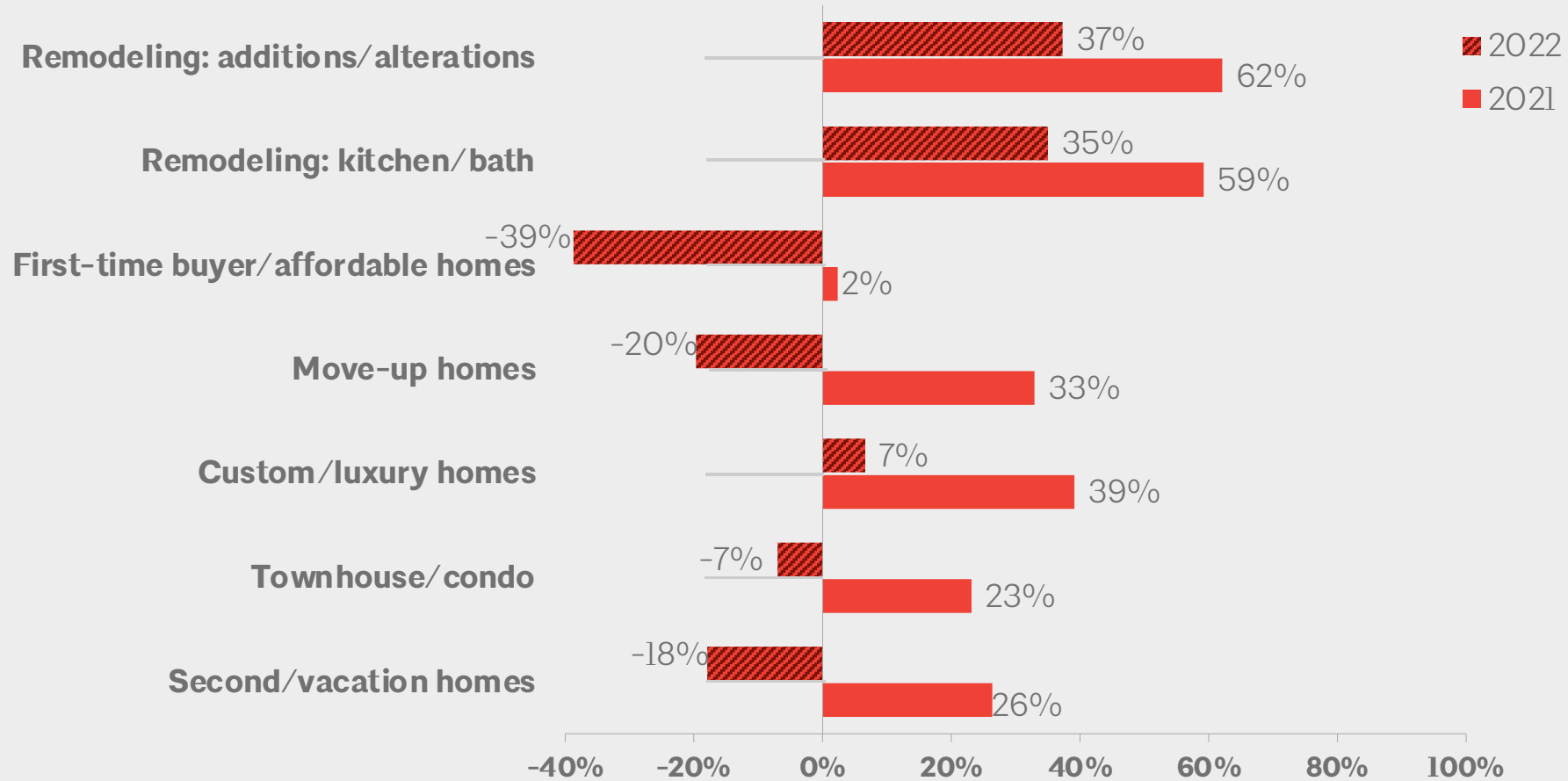
